


What is the BID and what does it do?

- Business Improvement District one of 300+ across UK & 17 in Wales
- Defined geographical area City Centre/Clarence Place/Riverfront/Clytha Park Road/Mill Street
- Private limited NFP company, elected by ballot of members in 2014 and again in 2019. Next re-ballot will be in November this year. More of that later!
- Governed by voluntary Board of Directors
- Second five-year term started April 2020
- Funded by 1.25% levy for businesses with rateable value +£5k. Just under 600 levy payers
- Delivers business plan across three themes Welcome, Future, Safe & Secure
- Annual income of approx £175k in 2024-25. Joint lowest levy bill in BID's history. Continue to seek external funding









- Grant available to levy payers since 2017
- Can pay up to 75% (maximum £1,000 inc VAT)
- For external works painting/signage/lighting
- Applications open again in May. Limited budget


Newport Wales Marathon

- Sunday, April 28
- Three races this year: marathon, half-marathon & 10k
- All start in the city centre this year
- Marathon & half-marathon start at 9am; 10k starts at 9.45am
- 6,000 runners & 10,000 spectators expected from 7.30am onwards
- Big opportunities for hospitality sector in particular
- Experience from previous events suggest 60% of all runners will eat out in Newport on the day, with an average spend of £32 per person

- November 16 in usual venue
- Music, celebrity guests, Santa, fireworks
- Funded by grant from Shared Prosperity Fund



Importance of events

- Footfall in Newport city centre in 2023 was up 32% compared to 2022.
 In Wales it was up 2% and in the UK up 3%.
- Footfall in Newport city centre in 2023 was up 6% compared to 2019. In Wales & the UK it was down 13%.
- Footfall in Newport city centre in the first 2 months of 2024 was up 13% compared to the same period last year. In Wales it was down 6% & in the UK it was down 3%.
- Almost entirely driven by events (ie football this year).
- Increased footfall doesn't mean increased trade but the potential is there. How can businesses capitalise on events?





Future Newport

- Savings Advisory Service: saved BID members £100,000+ to date
- Gift Card: Can only be spent in participating city centre stores.
 Keeping Newport pound in Newport.
- City centre app: Promoting businesses via loyalty deals, offers, trails & events. Will be relaunched later this year.





How to play NBaC Who's Who?


- Each player joins NBaC DISC

- Winners are those who identify the offenders and stop them entering their premises.






Disc empowers communities to share information so they can better protect themselves and their property, staff and customers

Disc is the online information-sharing system that's helping all kinds of communities reduce low-level crime and anti-social behaviour.





Number of Incidents processed












Some recent shop findings



- 5.6m incidents of shop theft recorded in the last year
- 76,000 incidents of violence against people working in convenience sector in the last year.
- 87% of colleagues working in convenience stores have experienced verbal abuse over the last year.
- 34% of verbal abuse incidents are hate motivated, according to retailers.
- 61% of retailers believe anti-social behaviour in or around their store has increased in the last year.
- 76% of retailers believe incidents involving organised crime groups have increased in the last year.

Purple Flag status



- UK accreditation for nighttime economy – similar to Blue Flag for beaches
- Highlights city centre as a safe & vibrant place for a night out
- Swansea is the only other Welsh place with Purple Flag status
- Applying to retain later this year



Night Ambassadors project



- Funded via Police & Crime Commissioner
- No cost to levy payers
- Cover area wider than BID area
- Assisting lone women, general public, licensees, police & licensing authority
- Funding secured to extend scheme to end of March 2025



2024 re-ballot

- BIDs run for 5 years at a time
- Newport Now completes its second term in March 2025
- New business plan for 2025-30 to be created this year in consultation with levy payers
- This will be launched in September
- Ballot of all levy payers in November
- It is up to YOU to decide whether Newport has a BID beyond next March



What does a YES vote mean?

- The BID continues until at least the end of March 2030
- At least £175k a year invested in city centre projects and services
